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OVERVIEW & PURPOSE

Forestry, Fisheries, and Farming (FFF) communities keep Rhode Islanders fed and tend our landscapes. But workers in these fields often face challenging and unpredictable conditions with limited support. Together we aim to offer services in the languages you speak, and seek out providers who understand natural resource sector challenges and reflect the diverse cultural backgrounds of the FFF communities.

Our goal is to provide a collection of practical, up-to-date financial and mental health resilience materials for fisheries businesses and individuals in the state of Rhode Island, and for the people and organizations who support the forestry sector.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

Fishermen. YOU are the most important piece of equipment on your boat. Regular maintenance - and critical repairs - help keep both you and your business running smoothly. Please know that help is available for you in Rhode Island, to support your physical and mental health.

- 1. Are you in crisis? Call the National Suicide Prevention Hotline now, at 1-800-273-8255, or text HELLO to the Crisis Text Line at 741741.** Both services are free, confidential, and available 24/7. As of July 16 2022, the number **988** will serve as a call or text hotline for suicide prevention nationally.

2. [Land & Sea Together](#) is offering **free** access to [Coastline EAP](#) for all farm, forestry, and fisheries professionals (and their families) in the state. An EAP, or “Employee Assistance Program,” is a voluntary and confidential resource connecting individuals and families with financial and personal services in the community. Services include referrals for child and elder care, health and wellness consultations, financial consultations, and up to *12 FREE counseling sessions* with a licensed provider, and more. **Call 1-800-445-1195 to learn more.**
3. **Struggling with substance use? This crisis affects individuals and families across the state, and you are not alone.**
 - a. [SAMHSA](#) (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration) offers a National Helpline, at **1-800-662-4357**. The helpline is a free, confidential, 24/7 information service, available in English and Spanish, for individuals and family members facing mental health and/or substance abuse disorders. This service provides referrals to local treatment facilities, support groups, and community-based organizations.
 - b. At [Prevent Overdose RI](#), you can call **401-414-5465** to connect with a licensed counselor 24/7. Rhode Island also offers buprenorphine, a medicine used for opioid addiction, over the phone. You can find out more information by calling the Buprenorphine 24/7 Hotline at **401-606-5456**.
 - c. Visit the [Prevent Overdose RI](#) website to learn more about the following:
 - i. **Safe Stations:** Fire stations in East Providence, Newport, Providence, and Woonsocket where you can drop in 24/7 to get access to treatment and recovery support services.
 - ii. **Recovery Centers:** Places where you and your family can get support in recovery in a safe and drug-free environment.

FUNDING YOUR ENTERPRISE: GRANTS, LOANS, AND SUPPORT

Fishermen need access to capital. Most fishermen use a combination of grants and loans to acquire infrastructure, make new purchases and improvements, and improve the viability of their businesses.

1. Fishermen can access state and federal **grant funding** from a number of entities. Many grants are cyclical, so please check the links to see if the grant is currently accepting applications.

2. Fishermen can access public and private **loan programs** from a number of entities across the Northeast. Keep in mind that interest rates and conditions may vary.

SUCCESSION PLANNING

As Rhode Island fishermen consider retirement, and the future of their businesses, it is critical that families come together and establish a transfer plan. This can be an intense and sometimes emotional process, especially without an established successor. Take a deep breath. There are a number of organizations and resources that can help.

3. The Center for Mediation & Collaboration RI offers [mediation services](#) in the state, in partnership with the USDA. Mediators can aid with bringing all stakeholders (all involved family members and the lender) back on the same page to work through all those issues that matter to them (e.g. questions about possession, debt, equity, and fairness between family members).

LABOR

Attracting and retaining skilled labor is a major challenge for many fishermen. How and where are folks finding reliable employees? How and where are employees finding supportive environments where they can learn and grow?

2. [Commercial Fishing Apprenticeship Program \(CFAP\)](#) is a crew training program designed and offered by the East Farm Commercial Fisheries Center of Rhode Island and in cooperation with the University of Rhode Island, commercial fishermen, and the supporting shoreside businesses of Point Judith.

The training provides essential knowledge and skills to hard-working, self-motivated, and dependable men and women. Upon completion of the month-long training, participants will have the potential to become the next generation of conservation-minded fishermen and secure full-time employment

aboard local commercial fishing vessels.

The program consists of hands-on, classroom-based training sessions, and at-sea training. Hands-on components will include safety training, seamanship, navigation, basic vessel maintenance, gear design and repair. Classroom sessions will include Fishing as a Business, Rhode Island Fisheries Management and Regulations, Cooperative Research, Data Collection, Species Identification, and the Ethics of Responsible Fishing Practices. As part of the program, apprentices get 3 days at sea and get to experience different types of fishing and gear types. Training locations are both Point Judith and Kingston, Rhode Island.

3. Are you a student at URI or CCRI, who is passionate about learning about our food system? The newly established [Rhode Island Agriculture and Food Systems Fellows Program \(AFSFP\)](#) aims to “engage and train students passionate about careers centered on food – as producers, processors, policymakers, educators, advocates or communicators.”

MARKETING

ACCESSING CRITICAL RESOURCES AND PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Health insurance, child care, and retirement. Let’s talk about building a secure financial and personal life in one of the most expensive states in the nation.

1. Health Insurance

- a. Compare plans on the state-based marketplace, [HealthSource RI](#). Fishermen can access health and dental insurance from Blue Cross Blue Shield of Rhode Island, Neighborhood Health Plan of Rhode Island, and Delta Dental.

- b. The [Rhode Island Office of Healthy Aging](#) offers help navigating Medicare coverage and programs. Call **1-888-884-8721** for more information.

2. Child Care

- a. The [Rhode Island Early Learning Council](#) offers a full list of early childhood state programs, including Head Start and BrightStars.
- b. Many fishing families may be eligible for the [Child Care Assistance Program](#) (CCAP), which can subsidize child care for RI residents.
- c. [BrightStars RI](#) “helps early learning, education and school-age programs that care for children learn about best practices and apply them to the care children receive... BrightStars also helps families in Rhode Island access quality child care, early learning, and school-age programs through our referral program. Families may search for programs online or call our toll-free number, **1-855-398-7605**, to speak with a referral specialist who can assist in finding a program that fits their needs.”
- d. [Land & Sea Together](#) has limited funding available for vouchers for DHS licensed childcare facilities and for licensed Elder Care for members of the FFF community. Referrals and support is also available through Land & Sea Together’s helpline, in conjunction with Coastline EAP- **Call 1-800-445-1195 to learn more.**

3. Retirement

- a. The [Alaska Fishermen’s Network](#) has a helpful post highlighting the options for planning for retirement as a commercial fisherman.
- b. [Louisiana Direct Seafood](#) has a number of videos on retirement and business succession planning.
- c. [We Can Help You, Inc.](#) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization with a mission of educating individuals about Medicare and Social Security as they begin their transition into retirement. **It is a free service for people with disabilities or for seniors over 65.** This organization helps with finding plans, accessing the resources available through those plans, finding home services, companionship, and more. The team has English and Spanish speaking consultants, who work together to best help individuals with their healthcare needs.

The AMOR Support Line (401-675-1414) is a 24-hour multilingual (currently English & Spanish) line that connects community members to AMOR’s network of services, including comprehensive mental health care, legal support, court accompaniment, community support, transportation, and interpretation.”

[Commercial Fisheries Center of Rhode Island](#) is “the home for the Ocean State’s

commercial fishing community... [They] seek to preserve the sanctity of our community, the solvency of our small business and the sustainability of the fishery resource. The Commercial Fisheries Center of Rhode Island is our headquarters to bring fishermen, scientists, managers, and elected officials together in a collaborative effort to improve our fisheries and our understanding of the marine environment so that the proud heritage of our industry continues nobly through future generations.”

[DEM- Rhode Island](#) is the state’s Department of Environmental Management, and its mission is to “protect, restore, and promote our environment to ensure Rhode Island remains a wonderful place to live, visit, and raise a family.” The Division of Marine Fisheries offers information about regulations, relief assistance programs, research, and more.

[Farm Fresh RI](#) is a non-profit organization with a new hub in Providence, Farm Fresh’s mission is “to grow a local food system that values the environment, health, and quality of life of the farmers and eaters in our region.” This mission is expressed through Community Access Programs, which include Farmers Markets, Farm to School and Community Education, Bonus Bucks, and Harvest Kitchen’s culinary job training program; and Food System Enterprise Services, which include Market Mobile and Harvest Kitchen’s food production and processing.

[Ocean State Community Seafood](#) educates the Rhode Island community about local fishermen, and the state’s abundance of diversified species of locally-caught seafood that can be purchased directly from fishermen’s boats.

[Rhode Island Lobstermen’s Association](#) is a “a nonprofit association that works towards the implementation of practical and meaningful State and Federal regulatory measures which take into consideration the welfare of the fishermen while building a sustainable fishery.” Their website has a list of helpful fisheries resources.

[Rhode Island Sea Grant](#), located at the University of Rhode Island Graduate School of Oceanography, “supports research, outreach, and education programs designed to foster the resiliency of local and regional communities and marine environments... Through network building and collaboration, fisheries and aquaculture specialists connect industry and consumers with the best available science to build vibrant local markets for Rhode Island fishery and aquaculture products through ecosystem-based management practices, as well as continue its commitment to provide training for safe seafood

processing.”

[Rhode Island Shellfisherman’s Association](#) is “dedicated to the improvement of the working conditions of shellfishermen in RI, to the enhancement and preservation of Narragansett Bay, and the promotion of shellfish products.”

The [Tomaquag Museum](#) is Rhode Island’s only Indigenous cultural education center and museum. Tomaquag’s Indigenous Empowerment Network (IEN) “strives to eradicate poverty in the Indigenous Community of Rhode Island through education, cultural competency, job training, employment, small business incubation, addressing social justice, and building equity through Tomaquag Museum and our ever-expanding network of partners.”

New England and Beyond:

[Local Catch Network](#) is a “hub for knowledge exchange and innovation to support and catalyze local and community-based seafood systems... Local Catch Network members include seafood harvesters who sell their catch locally and regionally through direct marketing channels as well as those engaged in research, technical assistance, and community organizing.” LCN offers technical assistance, USDA LAMP grant support, a business accelerator program, and many other resources. Their shared email list is vibrant and collaborative.

[Northeast Seafood Coalition](#) is “a non-profit membership organization representing commercial fishing entities in the northeastern United States on political and policy issues affecting their interests as participants in the multispecies (groundfish) fishery... [They strive] to find creative solutions that work to rebuild fish stocks while preserving family-owned fishing businesses and a diverse groundfish fishing fleet.”

[SEMAP \(Southeastern Massachusetts Agricultural Partnership\)](#) “dedicated to preserving and expanding access to local food and sustainable farming through research and education.” They provide a monthly newsletter highlighting jobs, opportunities, upcoming events, host workshops and conferences, and connect consumers with local producers.
